With 157 AKC recognized breeds to choose from, people need to do their research and select the dog that best fits their family."



Talking About the Breed: Facts to consider about a Cavalier King Charles Spaniel

Cavaliers are house dogs who want to be with their human family members and will follow them from room to room. Puppies need socialization and training to become well-adjusted, well-trained members of the family.

- This breed loves children who are gentle and well-behaved.
 Children who are loud, boisterous or rough will frighten a Cavalier.
- Cavaliers are a longhaired breed and
- need regular grooming to avoid a tangled or matted coat.
- A fenced in yard is a must for a Cavalier.
 The fence and gate must be secure enough at the bottom so the dog cannot slip

or dig out from underneath, as well as tall enough (at least 4 feet).

 The breed has the highest percent increase over the past decade in terms of popularity -- having moved up the AKC's list from 75th in 1996 to 27th in 2006 — a 511% increase. Therefore you must be extra diligent in locating a reputable breeder as unscrupulous breeders and importers abound. AKC Agility information

Agility is a sport that appeals to young people and to senior citizens. It has great spectator appeal. Agility is designed to demonstrate a dog's willingness to work with its handler in a variety of situations. It is an athletic event that requires condi-



tioning, concentration, training and teamwork. Dog and handlers negotiate an obstacle course racing against the clock.

The AKC offers two types of agility classes. The first, Standard Class, includes contact objects such as the dog walk, the A-frame, and seesaw. Each of the contact obstacles has a "safety zone" painted on the object and the dog must place at least one paw in that area to complete the obstacle. The second is Jumpers with Weaves. It has only jumps, tunnels and weaves poles with no contact objects to slow the pace.

Both classes offer increasing levels of difficulty to earn Novice, Open, Excellent and Master titles. For complete information and to read the remainder of this article please go to AKC.org/events/agility/index.cfm



Legislative update

There are many concerns for dog owners about the laws being proposed by legislatures and city governments across the country. Some of these legislative activities are designed to address a specific situation but actually have the potential for many unexpected and undesirable effects. Other legislation is the result of very well funded extremist organizations pursuing their goals of eliminating animal ownership or imposing their extreme views

through legislation. We will be discussing these topics in future newsletters as well as providing an update of local and AKC legislative concerns and activities. If you are interested in reviewing some of these activities please go to www.akc.org/canine_legislation and read about the successful elimination of California AB 1634 which would have required owners to spay or neuter all dogs and cats six months of

age, with few practical exceptions or about the changes signed into law in the Louisville, KY's Animal Control Ordinance requiring home inspection and expensive fees for owning unaltered dogs. Please contact a club officer and relate any local issues you become aware of so that we are all informed and can take action to protect our rights as dog owners.
